### GIS Analysis of Erie County Socioeconomic Status and Education by School District

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### How did my research start?

I initially wanted to explore:

- Does the zip code in which an individual lives impact the student's decision to pursue higher education?
- Does the zip code in which an individual lives impact the persistence and graduation rates of individuals attending colleges or universities?
- What, if any, is the connection between demographic features (socioeconomic status, ethnicity, etc.) and the decision to pursue higher education?
- What, if any, is the connection between demographic features (socioeconomic status, ethnicity, etc.) and the persistence and graduation rates of individuals attending colleges or universities?

### What has changed?

I narrowed down my topic to explore:

- Which public school districts have the highest percentage of economically disadvantaged students?
- Does the public school district in which an individual lives impact the persistence and graduation rates of students?
- Does the location of the higher education institution have an impact on the overall percent of Pell Grant recipients attending the institution?

### Why did my research change?

Simply put, it was too much data to sort through for a five-week class!

There are 86 zip codes in Erie County, but only 28 school districts. Since I am focusing on education, it made sense to make that adjustment early on in my research. The demographic and socioeconomic information is readily available on the NYSED website.




However, this certainly remains an area of interest and there is a lot of potential for future research projects.


## Erie County School Districts

Generally speaking, the public school districts with a higher percent of economically disadvantaged students have a lower four-year graduation rate. This can be seen with districts like **Buffalo CSD** and Lackawanna CSD, both of which have a population of economically disadvantaged students over 80% – the highest rate in Erie county – and a graduation rate under 85% – the lowest rate in Erie county. On the opposite end of the spectrum, there are districts like **East Aurora** that have the lowest population of economically disadvantaged students at 13% and one of the highest graduation rates at 97%.


# Erie County Higher Education Institutions and Pell Grants





### Preliminary findings?

The overall socioeconomic status of public school districts does not necessarily correlate with the Pell Grant awards of higher education institutions within that school district.

- For example, the college with the highest percentage of Pell Grant recipients is located in one of the districts with the lowest overall percentage of economically disadvantaged students.
- Additional information surrounding the college plans of high school graduates could potentially guide further research, connecting public school district socioeconomic data and graduation rates with college and university Pell Grant data.
